The Presiding Officer declared the motion carried.

New Business - General Agenda

It was moved by Councilman Jerred and seconded by Councilman Rothleutner to approve a request from 311 Restaurant & lounge to extend their serving area to include a 60' X 24' patio area on the south side of the building. Mayor Opseth asked for discussion. There was none. Roll was called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting aye: Rothleutner, Carsrud, Carter-King, Jerred, Kuntz, McGrath, and Mayor Opseth. The Presiding Officer declared the motion carried.

It was moved by Councilwoman Carter-King and seconded by Councilman McGrath to approve a lease of real property with the Campbell County Fire Department for Fire Station #3. Mayor Opseth asked for an explanation of the request. City Administrator Napier explained this is property that the Fire Department has occupied for a while. In the original deed that transferred the land to the City, it was made clear that a sale or transfer could not take place even though it was to another Governmental entity. Clarification of how the land should be used is within the lease. After the discussion, roll was called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting aye: Carsrud, Carter-King, Jerred, Kuntz, McGrath, Rothleutner, and Mayor Opseth. The Presiding Officer declared the motion carried.

It was moved by Councilwoman Carter-King and seconded by Councilman Jerred to approve a bid award for the I-90/Hwy 59 Interchange Landscaping Project to Chalk Buttes Landscaping in the amount of \$88,524.76 (1% Project). Mayor Opseth reiterated that this is a 1% Project. Roll was then called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting aye: Carter-King, Jerred, Kuntz, McGrath, Rothleutner, Carsrud, and Mayor Opseth.

Administrator's Report

Mayor Opseth asked for an Administrator's report. City Administrator Napier reported there was none.

Special Orders of the Day

Mayor Opseth opened into a public hearing to amend the zoning ordinance of the City of Gillette, Wyoming, to add Section 7c.(9), recreational vehicles in a mobile home park. Ryan McGrath of Cox, Horning and McGrath Law Firm, representing Nodel Parks who operates two mobile home parks in Gillette, the North Gurley Mobile Home Court and the Antelope Mobile Home Court, expressed his support of the amendment, however, feels the five year sunset proposed in the ordinance will pose the same issues in the future of what the housing needs may be. He suggested either make the change permanent and allow mobile home parks to have RV spaces, or an auto renewal that would allow for the Planning Commission to see if the housing need still exists in the future. Councilman McGrath asked if an auto renewable amendment was passed could Council at anytime, deny it in the future. City Attorney Anderson stated that he is not familiar with an auto renewable clause. He is familiar with sunsets and open ended ordinances; this ordinance, as drafted, has a five year life span. After further discussion, Mayor Opseth closed the public hearing.

ORDINANCE 14-25

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GILLETTE, WYOMING, TO ADD SECTION 7 c. (9), RECREATIONAL VEHICLES IN A MOBILE HOME PARK

It was moved by Councilwoman Carter-King and seconded by Councilman McGrath to approve the foregoing Ordinance on first reading. Mayor Opseth asked for further discussion. There was none. Roll was called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting aye: Jerred, Kuntz, McGrath, Rothleutner, Carsrud, Carter-King, and Mayor Opseth. The Presiding Officer declared the motion carried.

Mayor Opseth opened a public hearing for the zoning map amendment for un-platted property generally located at 1500 Moonshiner Lane and legally described as a portion of the SW1/4, SW1/4, Section 29, T50N, R72W, of the Sixth Principal Meridian, Campbell County, Wyoming, from R-1, single family residential district, to R-S, suburban residential district. Mary Ann Marshall asked for clarification of what R-S, suburban residential district means. Development Services Director Hamilton explained that the difference is density and lot size. The minimum lot size for R-1 is 6,000 square feet and the minimum lot size for R-S is 22,000 square feet with the proposed zoning designation. Councilman Jerred asked how many lots will be on the property. Mr. Hamilton replied that he believes there will be six or seven lots that will encompass the property. After the discussion, Mayor Opseth closed the public hearing.

ORDINANCE 14-26

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE DISTRICT ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF GILLETTE, WYOMING, FOR UNPLATTED PROPERTY GENERALLY LOCATED AT 1500 MOONSHINER LANE, LEGALLY DESCRIBED AS A PORTION OF THE SW1/4 SW1/4 SECTION 29, T50N, R72W OF THE SIXTH PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN, CAMPBELL COUNTY, WYOMING, FROM R-1, SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, TO R-S, SUBURBAN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, SUBJECT TO ALL PLANNING REQUIREMENTS

It was moved by Councilwoman Carter-King and seconded by Councilman Kuntz to approve the foregoing Ordinance on first reading. Mayor Opseth asked for further discussion. There was none. Roll was called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting aye: Kuntz, McGrath, Rothleutner, Carsrud, Carter-King, Jerred, and Mayor Opseth. The Presiding Officer declared the motion carried.

Appeal hearing before the City Council of the decision of the board of Examiners which affirmed the determination of the Fire Marshal to require the installation of a key box at Marshall Jewelry. Bruce Marshall, owner of Marshall Jewelry, presented their argument to Council. Mr. Marshall began by stating that there is an ordinance which requires an outside key box on a new or remodeled business. Approximately a year ago, Marshall Jewelry remodeled their business and expanded from 2,000 square feet to approximately 3,500 square feet. Because of this, they are now required to install a key box on the outside of their business. Mr. Marshall stated that he has inventory with a retail value of several million dollars on hand and because of security issues does not feel having a key box would be in their best interest. Their insurance company requires that 70% of their inventory be secured in order to be insured, which leaves approximately 1.5 million dollars of inventory left on display. Mr. Bruce then explained the security alarm system installed in his building, and also explained a burglary process known as the "smash and grab" technique. He informed Council that he contacted seven other communities around Wyoming and found that five of the seven communities he contacted do not have a key box requirement. Councilman Jerred asked if there was equipment in the building that was fire prone. Mr. Marshall replied that he has an oxygen torch, but nothing is on when there is no one present. Councilman Jerred asked if there was a fire suppression system. Mr. Marshall replied there was not. Councilman McGrath asked for a response time if the Marshall's were called due to a fire. Mr. Marshall replied that he and his wife are approximately 12 minutes away. Their Store Manager is less than eight minutes away. They also have other employees with key access should the need arise. Councilman McGrath asked if there was a fire, what their insurance company's policy is if the fire department does need to break the glass in the windows. Mr. Marshall replied that both he and the insurance company would expect the fire department to go through the windows. Councilwoman Carter-King asked what cities Mr. Marshall spoke with that did require lock boxes. Mr. Marshall stated Cheyenne and Cody. Councilman Carsrud asked if Mr. Marshall was aware, during or prior to construction, that the lock box was a requirement. Mr. Marshall replied that he had found out after the construction was completed, however, his contractor could have known prior to the construction. Councilman Kuntz asked Mr. Marshall if there is a sprinkler system in his business. Mr.

Marshall stated there is not. Councilman Kuntz asked Development Services Director Hamilton if any of the other businesses located in the Silverado Center had sprinkler systems. Mr. Hamilton stated that he doesn't know. Mayor Opseth informed Mr. Marshall that the transcripts and the video were made available to Council. City Attorney Anderson commented for the record, that the appeal is on the record developed at the Board of Examiners and some of the testimony that Council has heard was not presented in front of the Board of Examiners. Mr. Anderson went on to say that the comments in regard to other cities and what their ordinances might have and the quotes that were attributed to someone about Knox boxes, were not presented to the Board of Examiners and therefore, the Board did not have the opportunity to rule on these arguments. Eric Acton, Fire Marshal, presented Council with examples of what a Knox box looks like, how it works and addressed points that Mr. Marshall had made in his argument. Mr. Acton stated that the presence of the box offers no more security than what is already there and that it would be easier for someone to do a "smash and grab." He requested that he be given time to research the other cities that do require and install the boxes so he could provide a list to the Council. Mr. Acton then explained entry access practices of the fire department. The fire department will break windows when it is appropriate to do so for purposes of ventilation, but not for entry. He then explained that once a window is broken, the fire department is then responsible for security to the building. When entry is accessed through a door, the door can be secured when the fire department leaves which is a benefit to the owner. Councilwoman Carter-King asked how many businesses in Gillette currently have the lock box in place. Mr. Acton stated approximately 300. Councilwoman Carter-King asked if the businesses were all new construction. Mr. Acton replied that some are due to new construction or newly altered buildings; some have also been requested by business owners. Councilwoman Carter-King then asked how the fire department gains access if there is no lock box. Mr. Acton replied that it depends on the circumstances. If immediate entry is needed then they will force the door open. If it's an instance where they can wait for a key holder to arrive, the fire department will contact the sheriff's office to make contact with the key holder. Councilwoman Carter-King asked about the keys for the lock boxes and where they are stored. Mr. Acton replied that there is a master key and each fire truck unit has a lock box with the key inside that can only be accessed by a punch code. If there is ever a question about illegal entry, then it can be audited. Councilman McGrath asked how many fire firefighters have a punch code to access these boxes. Mr. Acton stated that there are some volunteers, however, the general rule is Captain and above; special permission can be obtained from the Chief. Those who have punch codes to access the master key go through training and they know the expectation and security involved with this process. Councilman Carsrud asked who is responsible after the fire department leaves if the alarm is not re-activated. Mr. Acton replied that the fire department requires contact information so if access to the building is needed, then they have a contact person. If an alarm cannot be re-activated then fire department personnel will remain on scene until a contact person from the business arrives. Councilman Carsrud asked if the contractors know beforehand that the lock boxes are required to be installed. Mr. Acton stated that when the building permit is applied for, different agencies involved with that building have an opportunity to present their comments or requirements from that particular agency. Mr. Acton stated that he submits a letter in regard to the requirements and if a key box is required, then yes, it is in his submittal letter prior to the contractor obtaining a building permit. After the discussion, Mayor Opseth commented that the Board of Examiners

worked hard on this matter and he doesn't see how they could have come to any other conclusion than the one they made, and he expressed his appreciation for their time and efforts. However, he can also relate to the Marshall's. He went on to say that this is an International Code and doesn't feel that it is an ideal code. Mayor Opseth stated that he would like to see the Board of Examiners' decision overturned and then requested that City Administrator Napier and City Attorney Anderson work on re-writing the ordinance to possibly make the lock boxes optional. After the discussion, it was moved by Councilwoman Carter-King and seconded by Councilman Jerred to affirm. Mayor Opseth asked for further discussion. There was none. Roll was called on the motion with the following results. Council Members voting nay: McGrath, Rothleutner, Carsrud, Carter-King, Jerred, Kuntz, and Mayor Opseth. The Presiding Officer declared that the decision of the Board of Examiners, which affirmed the determination of the Fire Marshal to require the installation of a key box at Marshall Jewelry, is reversed.

Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 8:09 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Tuesday, August 19, 2014.
